

American Opens New Rest Room

Formal opening of the new women's parlor and rest room at the American theatre was made yesterday, when the doors were thrown open to the feminine public on one of the neatest and most attractive of theatre rest rooms in the west.

It is the old rest room at the theatre enlarged to practically three times its size and occupying most of the space under the gallery and back of the stairway. W. H. Sawson, owner, and George L. Mayne, manager, have spared no expense to make the parlor in every respect restful and inviting.

The walls are finished in a dull ivory and gold, with a cream colored ceiling. The woodwork is of mahogany. The room is lavishly fitted with wicker rockers, chairs, lounges and settees, finished in cretonnes of old rose, dull gold and delft blues. A dressing table completely outfitted, a writing desk and a reading table complete the furniture.

Later Mr. Mayne expects to include a large mirror, covering practically one side of the room. French doors hung in old rose velvet and a cozy fireplace in one of the rooms add much to its attractive features. The floor is heavily padded in a pearl gray carpet. Representative photographs of early Indian life and scenes from the southern part of the state adorn the walls.

A maid is constantly in charge. Everything possible is done to insure the comfort of American theatre patrons.
